

## **Following Wine**



Last month we looked at the three white Nobel grapes and this month we'll look at the three reds. They are **Cabernet Sauvignon**, **Merlot and Pinot Noir**. Again, they were called Nobel because until recently these six grapes comprised the majority of grapes planted for wine making. So let's look at these reds. Their flavor profiles can usually be broken down into whether they have red or black fruit flavors. Black fruit flavored wines generally tend to be darker and darker wines tend to be more full bodied, higher in tannins and bolder in taste. Knowing flavors you like and the flavor profile of a wine should help you in choosing wines in a restaurant or when buying to take home.

**Cabernet Sauvignon** is the predominant red grape worldwide and can grow in any climate that isn't very cool. It is a grape often used in blending. It can vary greatly in quality, structure and price. It can be rough and biting or soft and easy drinking. With both aging and oak it becomes rich, complex and satiny smooth. It's a black fruit flavored wine: black currants, berries and plums. It can also have spice, black pepper and herbal notes. It is high in tannins, medium to full bodied with a deep color. The less expensive Cabernets can be soft & fruity with medium body.

**Merlot** is most often a red fruit wine: cherries, raspberries and blueberries with cocoa and/or chocolate. It is deep in color and medium to full bodied. It is usually easy drinking, smooth, soft and fruity. The inexpensive ones are not complex but the more serious and expensive ones can be confused with Cabernets as they have a similar flavor profile.

Pinot Noir is a finicky, troublesome and challenging grape to grow. The grapes are very particular about climate and soil. That said however, a great Pinot Noir could be one of the best wines you'll ever have. It is a red fruit wine: cherries, strawberries and cranberries. It is lighter in color than the other two with a light to medium body and low to medium tannins. The wines are soft, fragrant, fruity and earthy. It is rarely blended.

Keep tasting, it's the best and most enjoyable way to learn.

# YCHHI BORN TO COMPETE 50 years of competitive sailing

As The Yacht Club of HHI gets ready to sponsor the 50th Harbour Town Cup Regatta this October 2nd and 3rd, I thought a brief history of the club's sponsorship and participation in sailing events and regattas over its history would be appropriate.

The organization of the first Harbour Town Cup (HTC), sponsored by Sea Pines Resort, in the spring of 1970 was the genesis of The Yacht Club of HHI. After putting on the HTC organizers and competitors of that event saw the need for a sailing club on Hilton Head Island and so they established the Hilton Head Sailing Club (the predecessor of YCHHI) in 1971.

Once the Sailing Club was founded in 1971, it took over the organization of the Harbour Town Cup Regatta (HTC). That very same year the club added another fall regatta, the Calibogue Cup. Both these regattas have continued each year since (Well almost, the exceptions were for Hurricane Matthew and Covid).

#### Other regattas and sailing activities sponsored or co-sponsored by YCHHI include:

#### 1970s

The fledgling HH Sailing Club had an active spring and summer racing series for big boats (PHRF) and later small boat racing and even a model boat fleet.

In 1976 the North American Quarter Ton Championships was the first national event organized by the Sailing Club and included 35 boats from all over the country and beyond. It was held in May 1976 and the first prize was an original painting by renowned artist Ray Ellis.

Other racing activity in the 1970s included the qualifier for the Admiral's Cup 1978 and the HH Offshore Invitational 1979. All this was happening before the HH Sailing Cub became YCHHI and began building the clubhouse.

#### 1980s

In addition to completion of the Clubhouse, the YCHHI saw an expansion of its sailing competitions with the addition of two new one-design fleets, J-24s and Flying Scots, both with active spring and fall series. In the 80's the Club hosted several South Atlantic Yacht Racing Assoc. (SAYRA) regional qualifiers, two J-24 state championships and one Flying Scot State Championship.

In addition to the traditional HTC and Calibogue Cup regattas, two fun regattas where added to the schedule, the All Island Regatta in 1985 and the Spingfest Regatta in 1986. These events focused on fun racing for sailors who were more cruisers than serious racers.

The initial All Island Regatta in 1985 had 35 participant boats and the following 1986 Springfest had 17. These events were held annually for several years and brought new competitors to the sport. This decade also saw the club run an active junior sailing program. One of the crews who participated in that program came in third in the USYRU (now US Sailing) national Sears Cup race in 1986.

#### 1990s

1990 saw the addition of a new fleet of boats owned by YCHHI, the one design JY-15. This fleet was initiated by the club hosting the first JY-15 Mid-Winter Regatta and saw boats and sailors from all over the US participate. This decade was very active in sailboat racing with five regattas being hosted in 1991. Participation in PHRF racing was at its peak with up to 30 boats starting on the line at a Caliboque Cup race in 1992 and 37 for the All Island Regatta in 1993. 1990 also saw the initiation of the "Beer Can" series races off the docks on Thursday nights in the summer using our JY-15 fleet. These races were casual and the only prize was satisfaction and beer! Through much of the 90's many YCHHI members were focused on training in race management for the Olympic sailing events which would be held in the waters off Savannah and HHI in 1996. In the spring leading up to the games, YCHHI co-sponsored the Finn Worlds and woman's Europa class Olympic qualifier. That June, just before the games, YCHHI also co-sponsored the Mumm Olympic Classes Regatta. For the 100th anniversary of the Olympic Games themselves YCHHI sent the largest set of volunteers, for its size, to assist in the Olympic Regatta. Due to the exposure the Olympics brought to sailing in our area and the skills of our regatta management, several other notable events were held after 1996 including the Mumm 30 World championship and the Melges 24 Nationals. YCHHI was lauded for both its race management and competition all through the 1990s.

#### The New Century

At the dawn of the new century, sailing on HHI was going strong at YCHHI. Our two traditional regattas, as well as the All Island Regatta, our Flying Scots series and our JY15 Beer Can Series all had active participation. Though the early 2000's PHRF racing was active but the All Island Regatta was dropped in favor or increased participation in the HTC and Calibogue Cup Regattas. As the 2000's became the 2010's and 20's the sport of sailing in general and that at YCHHI has slowed down some. The Club sold off the JY-15 fleet and many of our old faithful PHRF racers are now just older and not as active. The loss of the dock at Palmetto Bay Marina due to Hurricane Matthew and the recent pandemic have taken a toll on sailing competition. One result was to combine our two traditional regattas to a single regatta weekend in the fall to try and maximize participation.

However, stay tuned and ready! The future is not bleak! In the last 5 years the Club added more Flying Scots to fleet 134, making 7 boats the largest fleet in its history. In addition, through the efforts of Jim Landis, Hap Todd, and others, a new co-sponsored PHRF race, with the Landings YC, has initiated racing from HHI to the Landings on Skidway Island. This year will be the 6th running of The Hook Regatta.

As we approach the 50th anniversary of our inaugural regatta, the Harbour Town Cup, The Yacht Club of Hilton Head Island can take pride in our rich history of competition and comradery.



#### HILTON HEAD HEROES UPDATE

Since the last Main Sheet the Yacht Club Hero program has taken out three families on the water for their private family boat trip. The first family was visiting from Minnesota made up of Mom and Dad and three boys, ages 17, 15, and 12. The skipper for this trip was Bob Golden with me as crew. We had a beautiful day with a circumnavigation around Pinckney Island but the highlight was the dolphin display. Bob and I were surprised to learn from the family that there are no dolphin in Minnesota but the ones we spotted this day were in full Sea World mode including full



leaps out of water with double twists. Unfortunately the Bulgarian judge only gave the performance a 4.2. The family wrote Bob a very nice Thank You Note with assorted pictures that Kathe has posted on the bulletin board in the hallway of the Club.

The 2nd family was from Arizona with Mom and Dad and four kids, ages 13 to 8. For this trip, Ernie and Terri Ahr were the club skippers and took the family down Broad Creek and around Buck Island, with each of the kids driving the boat and unfortunately all the dolphins must have put so much into the previous week's performance that they didn't have the energy to show up.

Remember all the rain we were having recently, we finally were able to get a trip in during a beautiful morning on Friday. Trip around Pinckney with kids driving a boat for the first time with Mom and Dad taking bunches of pictures and videos. Again, just a couple of dolphin spotted in the distance but the family still had great time.
